



I wonder if you have emerged from your Covid-19 or winter 'hibernation' yet? I wonder if this recent quote in *The Church Times* strikes a chord:

"One person put it best when they said it was as though the pandemic had caused us all to 'lose the muscle-memory of how to be together'."

Now that the days are longer, bulbs are showing, and the sun appears occasionally, it feels as if life is beginning again! Many are re-discovering the joy of joining in services and activities such as Craft group, Lunch Club, Life Groups or ABC at St Andrew's - even though we may still need to adhere to some sensible precautions.

God made us for relationships - with Him and with each other - and seeing people as they emerge from their 'hibernation' has been fantastic.

What I learnt about Ruth

ALL THAT YOU SAY, I WILL DO!

Our study topic for most of January and February was the little-known Book of Ruth. After the series of sermons and studies, Patrick Davies looks back on what there was to discover...

t's easy to miss the book of Ruth in the Old Testament - it takes just 4 chapters over about 3 pages, and tucks itself into the Old Testament \blacksquare between the much longer books of Judges (21 chapters) and Samuel (54 chapters). It's an unusual book of the Bible - telling an everyday story of a widowed woman and her widowed mother-in-law - and in it we do not see or hear from God directly at all!

So, why would it be relevant to us here in Oxshott in 2022, to spend our time thinking about this woman who lived around 2,500 miles away and

2,500 years ago ...?

Well, I believe this very real and very human story shows us some really important things about God and ourselves, and about how God works in our everyday human lives.



'Ruth' goes some way to exploring a big question that many have asked throughout the ages: Are our lives within God's complete control, or are things really down to us and our actions?

If God is completely in control. does anything we do really matter?

And, if everything is really down to our own choices and actions, how can it be that God is really God at all?

Falling too far on one side of the argument leads to a kind of 'Let go and let God...' attitude, a passivity which can, at worst, encourage things like the refusal of medical treatment, in the hope of supernatural miracles, rather than more human means of treatment - or a disregard for evidence around climate change.

Falling too far on the other side has led to well-intentioned (but often misguided) zeal in pursuing earthly 'good' devoid of God - such as March 2022 **Church News**

the ideas of Marxism - resulting in all kinds of unhealthy attitudes to one another and ourselves.

A third way...

The story of Ruth, however, offers a third way. As our studies revealed, if you look closely, you will see that every prayer offered in the story is answered by the end of the book - but it is the actions of the characters that answer each and every one.

God is at work, yes, but in the background - influencing, not controlling, the story, and not removing responsibility from those human players.

It is the actions of Naomi, Ruth and Boaz which lead them to the wonderful circumstances they enjoy at the end of the book; their planning and action turn the story around.

But throughout the story, they rely and trust in a faithful God - and even see their actions as God's faithfulness to them. As we see them act, they set out a pattern which we can emulate today: pray to God, work with God, and thank God.

So, as we seek to neither neglect our human responsibility in the world, nor embrace the heaviness of mistaking ourselves for God, perhaps we might, like Ruth, match our actions to our prayers - such that what we trust and hope for in God, is what we plan and do with our life.

They returned safely to South Africa on 5 January, feeling refreshed and rejuvenated.

The weather, though boiling hot, was perfect because we had no wind, and God blessed us with the provision of 5 gazebos during the lunch, so for the first time, everyone ate in shade!

We really could not have done this without you all and want to take this opportunity to thank you all once again for your amazing generosity and partnership with The Gathering.

The Finnies faithfully send monthly newsletters and videos on behalf of their church to keep us informed about their plans and activities (to keep up to date, go to the Mission Partnership section of our website), and are regularly in touch with our Life Group that supports them.



Life in South Africa continues to be challenging for the family, so they are extremely grateful for St Andrew's support. There have been exorbitant price increases on many day-to-day basics and utilities - water, electricity and fuel have all risen steeply.

Last year, our church donated £4,680 in addition to the money raised for the Welcome lunch. All this helps towards the running costs of the soup kitchen and literacy and numeracy classes that The Gathering organise.

Thank you all very much for your prayers and continued support for the Finnies and their church.



London's streets brought to life

Oxshott Art & Crafts Society was delighted to welcome back popular local artist Jim Hanlon on 8 February. **Miranda Fuller** was there...

We were delighted to welcome Jim Hanlon for his demonstration for us of a street scene in acrylics; our first of the year, the demonstration was well attended and much enjoyed by all. Jim had chosen for his subject The Strand, looking west and featuring St Clement Danes church and the Royal Courts of Justice. Using a canvas

board, he first sketched his composition before applying a warm grey wash. Then, focussing on tonal values, he blocked areas in, with a mix of warm grey, ultramarine and burnt sienna, using a square brush, on edge for any lines, taking care not to apply the colours too opaquely. For the sky, Jim used a mix of titanium white and Naples yellow and, for the trees, raw sienna and ultramarine. Emphasising the need to

distinguish light, dark and medium tones and adding touches of warm grey to

soften the brightness of the colours, he painted in the buildings, pavements

and road, adding raw sienna, yellow ochre and tiny dashes of crimson. With none of the detail and precision of an architectural painting, the finished work was a pleasingly soft, loose and subtle yet easily recognisable representation of the subject - pictured above with Jim.

What do you know about glass?

Arts Society trips are very varied; **Nicky Orlebar** explains how a trip to Rye revealed so much about glass and glass making...



lass specialist Andy McConnell from *The Antiques Roadshow* enthusiastically welcomed local Arts Society members to his home town of Rye on the East Sussex coast. After coffee at his shop, called Glass Etc., we gazed in awe at the quantities of glass in all shapes, colours and sizes which filled his ... glass shelves.

We walked to the nearby Fish Café for our two illustrated lectures.

Andy explained that glass is made of silica, soda ash and lime, and has been known about since 4000 BC. His first talk focused on James Giles, a Huguenot living in London, who perfected the art of gilding and enamelling on glass between 1760-75. With a government tax on clear glass, bone ash was added to make clear glass resemble porcelain. Wealthy patrons then choose their preferred decoration from pattern



books. Powdered coloured glass mixed with lavender oil would be painted onto the glass, before firing at a temperature which would not melt the glass underneath.

Andy's second presentation was about the *Impact of Glass* which he reckoned to be 'the most important substance ever created by man'. Before

Damascus fell to the Moguls in 1405 AD, the local glassmakers fled to Venice and thence into Europe. Andy mentioned that glass has given us windows, stained glass, mirrors, lenses - in spectacles, telescopes and microscopes (which helped Galileo and Pasteur), thermometers and cameras, to name but a few uses.

After a lunch of local cod, members set off, map in hand, to explore the narrow, cobbled lanes. Rye was not one of the original Cinque Ports but in 1336 was included due to its flourishing trade across the Channel and provision of warships for the monarch.

THE ARTS

Continuing our walk through the conservation areas, we felt dwarfed by the beautiful 900-year-old St Mary's Church dominating the hill, as we viewed its huge stained glass from outside. We then came across the nearby Mermaid Inn, now an hotel. With cellars built in 1156 the inn was rebuilt in 1420 with curved timbers and low ceilings.

Too soon we were back at Glass Etc. for tea. Duly refreshed, Andy waved our coach off after a truly fascinating day in East Sussex.

It is sad to report that Andy's shop closed for good during the 2020 Covid lockdown.

Oxshott Station: a lost signal box

In our latest comparison of views around Oxshott, past and present, we can see a number of changes at Oxshott Station. And some things have stayed the same...

he views opposite are taken from the 'up' platform (towards Waterloo), and reassuringly, not much has changed! The general view and geography are the same, and some features from when the station was opened on 2 February 1885 are still in place – the station canopies, the footbridge, and the road bridge in the distance.

The track has changed; even in the 1950s there was a 'third rail' carrying the power to the trains, (the line was electrified in 1925, replacing steam locomotives), but in the foreground you can just see some points, which led to a small goods yard and the line to John Early Cook's brickyard, situated in what is now the Summerville Road area.

Two main changes are apparent; first, the platforms have been lengthened only recently, to accommodate 10-car trains instead of 8-car.

But the very obvious difference is that the signal box has disappeared in the intervening years. It was demolished in the 1950s (see below), after control of the local tracks was moved to a box at Cook's Crossing in Blundel Lane on 22 January 1951. (Control was then moved to Surbiton in 1970, when colour light signals were brought into use.)

We wonder what happened to the 'OXSHOTT' sign being removed in the picture below!
