



Falling leaves...

'Though outwardly we are wasting away, inwardly we are being renewed day by day.' 2 Corinthians 4:16

Dear Friends.

According to the Campaign to Protect Rural England, October is a month for the senses; trees change their colour, leaves rustle and are shaken from branches by the

wind. We wake to morning mists, and cool air. There are smells of wet and decay as plants start to die back, of fungi in the woods, of damp moss and ferns. Fruits are ripe in the hedgerows: crab apples, brambles and damsons, essential food for wildlife approaching the onset of winter.

Autumn is often characterised with melancholy - a kind of sweet sadness. remembering Summer and preparing for the challenges and chills of Winter. It is a season of slowing down, rest and renewal, and we trust in time it will lead to freshness, life and vibrancy. The outward 'wasting away' we see is essential if we are to enjoy the bursting forth of life in Spring.

In the coming months, St Andrew's Church may look like a bit like a tree losing its leaves; things may not always appear quite as beautiful or lively as they have done, as our Building Your Church project renews our tired buildings.

As the 'leaves' fall from our building, we may experience a sense of melancholy as we remember happy days of summer, and as bare 'branches' are exposed there may be times when we will wonder when the first buds of spring will again be seen. Yet, as with nature, life remains at the heart, strong beneath the surface, preparing to burst forth with freshness and colour in the season to come.

In his letter to the Church at Corinth, Paul reminds us that it is the unseen work of renewal inside each of us which will, in time, burst forth with vibrant life. Our inner spiritual health may be renewed, even when our leaves and branches are shaken and falling. The source of Paul's hope is the source of life itself, the true life which burst into the world in Jesus - the real, vibrant never-ending life which Jesus offers, and makes possible for us each.

May we look forward with hope, to what is to come!

Any moment now...


Work continues behind the scenes on our Building Your Church project...



Links with Pakistan

We are pleased to have our Mission Partner links with Pakistan, in particular with OTS, and Qaiser and Rahila Julius joined us for a few days in September to cement those links.

Qaiser is the Executive Director of OTS (The Open Theological Seminary), a non-denominational seminary that provides Christian teaching to over a thousand



Rahila was able to tell us, with a recorded video and in person, about her project Help for the Helpless. Rahila founded and runs this Christian charity, that reaches out to marginalised Christian women and helps them by teaching sewing skills; after a year's training, at their graduation, they are provided with a sewing machine and the tools to run their own small business. They have opened ten of these centres in the past six years, and Rahila had a small number of samples of their handiwork to show us and for sale.

Licensing of Revd Patrick Davies

On Monday 21 August, Archdeacon Martin Breadmore conducted a Licensing Service for Patrick.

This service commissioned Patrick to serve as Associate Minister in our parish, with particular focus on Families and Children. Please continue to pray for Patrick and his family as he begins this next exciting stage in his ministry here at St Andrew's.

Learning from Ukraine

Bible Sunday is this month, on 29 October, and it's easy to think that a Bible is easy to come by. By this is not always the case, as Ukraine demonstrates...

he war in Ukraine has led to a dramatic rise in the demand for Bibles, as people ask existential questions about life and death.

The Ukrainian Bible Society reports that, in the last 15 months, some

700.000 Bibles have been distributed across the war-torn country. This is a five-fold increase on numbers handed out before the war - in 2020, some 136,767 Bibles were distributed in Ukraine.

Anatoliy Raychynets, deputy general secretary of the Ukrainian Bible Society explains, "The experience of this time is that so many people are looking for Bibles and churches. We are doing everything



possible to reach all the needs, but more Bibles are needed. With the help of the Word of God, we can bring the love of God to those who need it."


Bibles are distributed around the country, including to soldiers and civilian communities on the front line, and to those in hospital. "Wherever the Bible is taken, it is very much appreciated," said Anatoliy.



Using an app to help the Foodbank...

Hello Foodbank Supporters! You may have seen an article in a recent *Waitrose Weekend* paper about an app called 'BanktheFood'. So why would this be useful to the Cobham Area Foodbank, one of our Mission Partners, we hear you ask...

anktheFood was first piloted in Southend Foodbank two years ago, and now has nearly 35,000 users helping 350 registered foodbanks across the UK, from the Isle of Skye all the way down to Cornwall.

We want to encourage people in the Cobham and Oxshott area to use this app, to help them remember what we need most for our foodbank, and to use the feedback loop to our warehouse, so we know in real time what is being bought.

See the list...!

You simply set the app to connect to our Cobham Area foodbank and immediately see the list of what is currently most urgently needed. There's also a list of local drop-off points. If you tick what you buy from the list on your phone, those details are transmitted immediately to the Manager of the warehouse, so she can see what's on the way. (This data is anonymous, so we don't see who buys what.)



You should also be able to use your settings to enable a notification to appear when you walk into Waitrose to shop, although this takes some experimenting, based on our experience so far... but in any event, if you just open the app anytime, you can see the list straightaway, wherever you shop.

Christina van Roest, Trustee & Manager of Cobham Area Foodbank, said, "We are very excited about this app and we hope it will make donating easier and more fun for our supporters. It will also help us to manage our stock more efficiently and

ensure we have always enough of the most needed items."

She added, "We are very grateful for all the donations we receive, but sometimes we do get too much of one thing and not enough of another. With this app, when you open it, you can immediately see the essentials we need most BEFORE you start shopping and put them in your shopping basket prior to reaching the checkout. It is then just a matter of dropping them in the donation box on your way out.



The app is free and easy to use, and can be downloaded from the App Store or Google Play or via this QR code:

Experience elsewhere

Experience from other foodbanks has shown that when this app is widely used, donations increase and more of the most needed items are donated, which is so helpful. And of course, it engages people in a new way with our foodbank, so we will be promoting this on our social media.

We will continue to publish the lists as before, on social media and on the collecting bins, and put out the foodbank labels in Waitrose, but this app provides another way for people to access the priority items and, most importantly, at the time when they need it.

It is of course just an option, so please do continue to support us, in the way you prefer. Most foodbanks, including our own, have suffered a significant drop in donations and many weeks we give out more food and provisions than we collect which is a cause for concern.

Over the top?

We asked a guest for some thoughts on modern life, and discovered that **The Ven John Barton** is intrigued by some modern-day usage of our language...

I'm trying to stop saying the word 'incredible'. It's overused and has become almost meaningless. "We are incredibly grateful"; "I had an incredible meal". As the word really means 'beyond belief or understanding', it can't actually apply – in either case.

'Unbelievable' is similarly misused. So is 'fantastic', which is meant to describe something belonging to an imaginary world. So, strictly speaking, a fantastic tennis player can't be a real one.



How about 'amazing'? Count how many times you hear it today. It should be reserved to describe something astonishing, out of this world. If you think about it, if everything is amazing or incredible, then nothing really is. When the exceptional becomes normal or commonplace, nothing is special.

We seem to be struggling to find words to convey something out of the ordinary. Try 'iconic'. Iconic only appeared recently and has been distorted to mean 'historic' or 'traditional' or 'classic'. My dictionary tells me iconic actually means something to do with an icon, which is a depiction of Christ, the Virgin Mary, or a saint. In fact, most of these over-the-top words, now in everyday use, have a religious association. Originally, they were reserved to communicate otherness, difference, deep respect.

Is it awesome?

For example, what about 'awesome'? It should mean inspiring 'awe' or reverence. It's a take-your-breath-away word. Awe is what Moses felt when he saw a bush on fire, because it didn't actually burn away, and he sensed the presence of God. Awe is something St Peter experienced, when he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!'

If you try to imagine what Moses and Peter actually felt, words like 'unworthiness' and 'fear' might come to mind. They really were experiencing something out of the ordinary, too hot to handle. They were out of their depth. An experience like that stayed with them for life. They had encountered holiness. Now there's a word worth using.

Colourful summer fun...

As **Miranda Fuller** reports, members of the Oxshott Art & Crafts Society (OACS) have had exhibitions and demonstrations to enjoy...

A sour pretty mixed summer turned into a pretty hot one, OACS continued to keep ourselves occupied. Sue Smith was busy organising A Library of Art, an exhibition by Surrey Figurative Artists at the Library, Leatherhead Institute, as part of Heritage Week; and several OACS members, who also belong to the Molesey Art Society, participated in the annual Molesey Towpath Exhibition, for




which both showers and extreme heat kindly held off. Pictured here (*left*) is our Wendy Hale and daughter, Amy, at Wendy's colourful stand.

It was with great pleasure that on 12 September we welcomed back popular artist Joel Wareing (pictured opposite), to start off our 2023/24 programme with his demonstration, Urban Night Scene *in Acrylic.* On a gesso primed canvas, Joel sketched the scene in pencil and fixed it with hairspray (a cheaper fixative) before applying a cadmium yellow wash around the figures. In yellow ochre, raw sienna and cadmium red wash and using long flat and filbert brushes, he covered all the lighter areas with fast, expressive strokes; then, with purple, ultramarine blue and cadmium yellow, worked on the darker areas, standing back regularly, squinting, to check tones

and ensure no white canvas remained. With no curved lines - just straight, strong and fast, he then put structural touches to figures and shapes with charcoal, not outlining any. Spraying fixative again, he then strengthened the colours, adding gloss medium rather than matt, for richness, before building up the dark areas, for which he used a warm palette of ultramarine, crimson and burnt sienna, all of them transparent; for black – burnt sienna and ultramarine.

With all dark areas finished, he began applying thicker paint, introducing white for the first time; for the mid-tones, mixing it separately with ultramarine, raw sienna, cadmium red and yellow and crimson. This thicker paint, he said, could



equally be applied with a palette knife. He finished with 'lost and found edges' – deciding which should blend into the background and which remain sharp – and stressed the importance of continually analysing tones and ensuring that the earlier colour washes did not become completely hidden by thicker paint, deadening the whole effect. Joel and his painting, pictured here, gave us a thoroughly enjoyable first demonstration and it was good to have him back.

Getting to Wisley in 2025

In the first of a series, we explain the improvements to the A3/M25 junction: This month, how the route to Wisley will change...

You may have spotted the huge new bridge support on the A3, just south of the M25, and wondered what it is for. Well, here's the answer: to get to Wisley!

Currently, to get from Oxshott to Wisley (and the RHS Gardens) involves driving down the A3 to the Ockham exit, and there going all the way round the roundabout, coming back up the A3 on the northbound side, before taking a hard

left up Wisley Lane.
Returning to
Oxshott from Wisley
is shorter, but more
fraught, as it involves
emerging directly
onto the A3 and
turning sharp left;
until recently, it also
involved crossing
traffic going into a
long layby.

The plans for the new layout... Bridge accommodating vehicles and non-motorised users No direct access to the A3 New bridge avoiding SPA and ancient woodland

And in future...

Once the roadworks have been

completed, getting to Wisley should be rather safer; you will still go down to the Ockham Junction roundabout, but take a new first exit, on to a two-way road that will take you over the new bridge over the A3, directly into Wisley Lane.

Returning, you would use the same road from Wisley, joining the northbound

A3 from the Ockham Junction roundabout. It is longer than before, but should be much safer and easier to navigate.

Completion is scheduled for 2025.




Have your say on a new political map...

New boundaries are being proposed for council divisions in Surrey, and the Local Government Boundary Commission wants to hear what you think, by 16 October. So how might these changes impact Oxshott?

xshott residents are currently represented across two of the wards of Surrey County Council (SCC): Cobham, and Hinchley Wood, Claygate and Oxshott.

The current boundary between the two (see map) follows the railway line through Oxshott: homes to the northwest fall within Cobham ward, represented by David Lewis, and those to the southeast (comprising most of Oxshott) fall within Hinchley Wood, Claygate and Oxshott, where Mark Sugden is our local councillor.

SCC proposes to redraw the boundary so that it runs south from the A3 along the western edge of the Heath, down to the Blundel Lane level crossing, and then north east along the railway to the A244 railway bridge, and then south on the A244 through the High Street to the existing border with Mole Valley. Oxshott would thus be split in two along the High Street - the area to the west would be part of the new Cobham ward and the area to the east part of the new Esher & Claygate ward.



Detailed maps showing the effect of the changes can be found (if you are persistent) at www.lgbce.org.uk/all-reviews/surrey You can give your views via that website, or by email, or by post (see panel opposite).

Critically, the changes would mean Oxshott would be cut in half in terms of who represents residents. It would be deprived of its separate identity, with the name disappearing from ward titles. In certain contexts, Oxshott may lose its 'voice' in future issues. This is also of concern to FEDORA and local councillors, and the proposed changes could complicate access to funding, etc.

But we suggest you examine the implications for yourself, and comment via the website above before the closing date of 16 October 2023.

The fortunes of an 18th century sheep farmer

When an Arts Society group visited Spencer House in St James's Place, SW1, our house guide acquainted us with the family's history, as **Nicky Orlebar** recalls...

aving made his fortune sheep farming at Althorp, the family seat in Northamptonshire, John Spencer the 1st Earl inherited the art collection of his great grandmother Sarah, Duchess of Marlborough.

Coupled with his Grand Tour purchases, a substantial London town house was obviously required.

In 1755 John
Vardy, a pupil of
William Kent, was
commissioned to build
a Palladian mansion
with the west front
overlooking Green
Park. With Vardy
building the exterior,
James 'Athenian' Stuart,
recently returned from



Italy, was instructed to design and paint the first-floor

interiors in the neo-classical style, which was in vogue following the discovery of Herculaneum. Completed in 1766, Spencer House was quickly recognised as being a most impressive residence befitting John Spencer's place in society amongst royalty.

We first entered the elegant Dining Room with its delicate frieze around the ceiling while the Palm Room was a mixture of gold and cream fronds with the pillars painted to resemble palm trees. The Staircase Hall with pale green walls was decorated with white pilasters unusually joined by garlands.

Upstairs, it was the Great Room with its sumptuous carpet, red silk walls and gold and cream coffered ceiling that was the highlight for some ASCO members. Others preferred the Painted Room – a masterpiece of Etruscan decoration.

By the 1900s, with agricultural rents at a low, the Spencers sought a succession of tenants to take over the house. Luckily, the 1980s saw leaseholder Lord Rothschild renovate the property, returning it to its 18th century heyday. Whether one's preference is for the architecture, sculpture, furniture, pictures (family portraits by Sir Joshua Reynolds), ceilings or carpets, today Spencer House is an exceptional *tour de force* of taste and grandeur.




