

Part of the community...

Dear Friends,

Exactly 1,700 years ago, from May until July in the year 325AD, Christian bishops from all around the world gathered in Nicea (in modern-day Turkey), called together by the Emperor Constantine, with the aim of addressing disagreements in the church about what was believed. This led to the forming of the

'Nicene Creed', an expression of Christian belief which starts with (and repeats) the uniting phrase 'We believe...' The Nicene Creed is, to this day, a statement of unity and inclusion across the Christian world.

Being 'We' – not only 'I' – is important as Christians, and, I believe, also for every human.

In the 17th Century, the poet John Donne wrote:

"No man is an island,

Entire of itself;

Every man is a piece of the continent,

A part of the main."

(Where he writes 'man' - really, we understand him to mean 'human'.)

We are inter-dependent – everyone is important - everyone contributes to the 'whole'. So, we have a responsibility toward one another – and we all benefit from existing in the network of relationships which we call 'the community' – literally, something 'shared, or owned, by all'.

In our village we are fortunate to experience a good sense of 'community' – but I am aware that sometimes it is still easy to be lonely – to find yourself an 'I' amongst the 'we's. However, at the heart of our hope for the renewed St Andrew's is that it would become more and more a place of welcome and connection – that no one should have to feel alone, a place to be with connect with another, and with God.

So...why not drop in for coffee, cake and company in our new café space – which is now open Mondays 11am–2.30pm, and 8.30am–2.30pm on Tuesdays and Wednesdays (in school term time).

We also hope that you might also be able to join us on Sunday 8 June, any time from 12noon – 4pm, for a Community Open Day, to officially mark and celebrate the completion of our building's renewal – details are on page 14.

What Pope Francis meant to me

After the passing of Pope Francis, our Vicar, **Revd Patrick Davies**, reflects on the life and style of the man who was leader of the Catholic Church for 12 years...

Pope Francis' appearance in front of the gathered crowds at the Vatican on Easter Sunday, along with his public address, were a surprise and joy to many after his weeks of declining health and stays in hospital.

Yet, his final remarks now resonate with even more profound significance

following his death, the very next day, on Easter Monday. With a certain prescience, Francis wrote:

"[The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ] fills us with the certainty that we too are called to share in the life that knows no end, when the clash of arms and the rumble of death will be heard no more. Let us entrust ourselves to him, for he alone can make all things new (Rev. 21:5)!

Happy Easter to everyone!"

Even for many non-Catholics, Pope Francis was admired as an example of Christian faith and leadership – a Pope who tried to embody Christ's message with humility, offering peace, hope and love in his words and actions.

As the first Jesuit Pope, Francis brought a distinct style of leadership to the Vatican - seeking in particular to highlight and prioritise issues of social justice and the environment whenever and wherever possible.

It was at theological college that I read 'Laudato Si' – subtitled 'Care for

Our Common Home' – an extended encyclical letter in which Francis set out his urgent and inspirational call to greater environmental stewardship, particularly advocating for the world's poorest people.

Francis held a progressive vision for the Church, where God's love and mercy were emphasised over doctrinal rigidity. He sought to align himself with the most



marginalised, chose to live simply, and communicated in a straightforward, down-to-earth way. He is quoted to have said: "I prefer a Church which is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security." He always wanted to be with the people, even at times at great risk to his own safety – and it was his choice that at his funeral his coffin would not be elevated, but at ground level.

At the smaller church in which he chose to be buried, above his simple tomb, illuminated by a single spotlight, the only decoration is a simple cross – the symbol of the self-sacrificial love of God shown to us in Jesus, which illuminated and shaped Francis' own life, ministry and papacy.

As I write, the doors of the Sistine Chapel have just been locked shut, sealing in perfect isolation the 133 cardinals who in the coming days have the daunting task to elect Francis' successor.

Nicki Galazka explains all...

he inspiration for the look and feel of our revamped buildings started well over a year ago with a vision from our vicar, Patrick. He felt we live in a really beautiful part of the world, with miles of stunning heathland right on our doorstep, and wanted to use this as the starting theme – bringing the beauty of nature inside to connect us with God's creation...

As we embarked on the work, the lead design elements were the two huge decals on the walls of the entrance and in the hall. These were taken on the heath – many of you may spot the exact location – by talented photographer Mark Goodman (accomplish.co.uk) who lives locally. The stunning greens and purples of the trees and heathers became the linking point for the colour scheme throughout.





Cosy areas for relaxing and chatting/meeting were built-in throughout – this carpeted lounge area in the entrance, as well as two further meeting rooms.

How did I get here?

It's no mean feat to run the London Marathon, and even more so when it wasn't really on your agenda – Oxshottian **Coralie Adams** tells her story...

n 27 April 2025 I stood on the start line for the 45th London Marathon. I never thought that would be me. I'd trained for 6 months, alongside a new job and my two littles – not things which go easily with marathon training. I'd been brilliantly supported by my husband, family, friends and the amazing community of Oxshott.

It was never supposed to be me, it was supposed to be my sister Frankie. The natural runner in the family, she always wanted to run the marathon but very sadly died from suicide in 2020 at the age of 29.

So when I stood on the start line, I did so in her memory and to support the amazing work Samaritans do – giving people somewhere to turn to when they really need it

Brilliant support

It was a very hot day (4th hottest marathon on record!), so definitely a challenge and one I wasn't prepared for, having trained over winter. The on-the-day support was incredible - I was lucky to have my parents, husband and eldest daughter Georgia and my fellow Oxshott running friend Laura cheering me on.

I am so thrilled to share that I managed to raise £4,578

for the Samaritans, which will fund approximately 800 calls of support answered.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to sponsor me, offer up words of encouragement and prayers. It meant so much.





Connecting with the beauty of nature

Our mission partner, A Rocha, has over the past 40 years sought to protect and restore the environment for God, nature and all people, as Mark Currie reports...

hurches throughout the land will be getting close to nature by taking part in a week-long nature count to monitor and celebrate the biodiversity in churchyards. This year the events take place from 7 June to 15 June.



In 2024, there were 6,354 records of nature spotted that were submitted by nearly 6,000 participants, representing a fantastic contribution to the understanding of the ecological value of the special places that the churches throughout this land tend to.



During the week you will find people from the St Andrew's community getting close to the earth, in the lovely church grounds, searching for evidence of the abundant and varied life that exists all around us. We will be



arranging a few one-hour sessions on various dates that week to do this. We will be:

- looking out for flowers growing wild in the garden such as the buttercup;
- identifying the trees in our churchyard;
- listening and looking out for the birds that frequent Oxshott in the hope of spotting a swift;
- getting down to the ground to identify the insects that frequent the undergrowth, and
- trying to identify the lichen growing in the grounds.
- We aim to record what we find on the iNaturalist app which will help us identify the plants and creatures living with us in the church gardens while generating data for science and conservation.

Creeping Buttercup Ranunculus repens Flowers May - August

This species is seen growing amongst short grass. It grows close to the ground and produces long runners which spread out to colonise the area. The leaves at the base of the plant are hairy with long stalks and are each cut into three, toothed, sections. The flowers are a deep glossy yellow with five petals and five sepals. The sepals are hairy and clasp the petals from below.

Visit Cobham Mill...

This local, early 19th century mill, in delightful surroundings on the banks of the River Mole, is Grade II listed and the only surviving fully working watermill in Surrey. It was originally part of a much larger mill complex.

The mill is open on the 2nd Sunday of the month from April to October,

2pm-5pm, so the next date is 8 June - and Admission is FREE!

The milling of corn is carried out during these openings, and a short video presentation about the mill and its restoration is shown at intervals.

Through an extensive programme of educational trips, we deliver first-hand experiences that embed classroom learning,


making subjects even more engaging and memorable.


Our children discover more about Tudor life and the infamous Henry VIII at the magnificent Hampton Court Palace.

As young archaeologists they unearth treasures and explore reconstructed ancient buildings from



Undoubtedly these trips boost independence, confidence and self-esteem, setting them up for success in their secondary school journeys.


By adding these extra-curricular activities to the established academic agenda, we create rounded and capable young children.



Remembering the Hurricane that crashed...

As we marked the 80th anniversary of VE Day in early May, **Teresa Newman** called to mind the newspaper cuttings that her father had kept here in Oxshott – and some events of 1940...

Hurricane in Oxshott field

AT the time the thoughts of the nation were concentrated on those who had died in the war, James Howard and his friends were busily digging up a tangible reminder of those wartime

On September 27th, 1940, a Hurricane fighter aircraft, on its way back from a patrol, crashed in a field in Oxshott.

Mr. James Howard, a civilian pilot, who is interested in wartime planes, recently locatedthe exact site where the plane crashed. Last Saturday he and other members of the Air Historical Group, hired a mechanical digger and raised

Its pilot P.O. Zak, a Polish airman, who is believed to be still living in this country. bailed out, and his plane crashed, nose first at 400 miles per hour, burying itself some 20 or more feet below the surface.

Plane crash drama WITHIN hours of the story of revealed

the recent excavation of a Hurricane fighter plane in Oxshott appearing in the News and Mail, last week, a reader put me in touch with the widow of Valerian Zak, the Polish airman who piloted the plane on the fateful night in September 1940, when it crashed into an Oxshott cornfield.

With the help of local people and the Royal Air Forces Association I have now pieced together both the heroic and personal story of Pilot Officer Zak, which reads like a romantic novel.

"If it had not been for the wonderful courage of my husband many people could have been killed or hurt in Oxshott," Mrs. Jeanne Zak told me from her home in Budleigh Salterton, Devon.

P.O. Zak's plane, badly

damaged by enemy guns, was on fire as it passed over Oxshott - although shot in the leg, he would not bale out until the plane was clear of the village -by which time he was badly burned.

Here begins the romantic

angle - Mrs. Zak, who lived in Oxshott, saw the whole incident and the parachute falling from the sky, jumped into her car and rushed to find the airman. The injured P.O. Zak was taken to Leatherhead hospital, where he remained for many months until his wounds were healed visited every day by Jeanne. "It

was during this time we fell in love," she explained.

P.O. Zak returned to operational duty rising to the rank of Wing Commander of 303 Squadron, and then in command of Heston Aerodrome.

Honours

He received the highest honours that the Royal Air Force and the Polish Air Force

could bestow on any man, the Virtuti Militaire which is the equivalent to our Victoria Cross also our own D.F.C. with two or three bars and the D.S.O.

In 1946 he married Jeanne and went to live in Surbiton: "We were blissfully happy" recalls Mrs. Zak.

Sadly Wing-Cdr. Zak did not live to see his Hurricane raised he died of cancer in Epsom Hospital in 1969 - and was buried in the Polish Airmen's cemetery at Northolt.

Mrs. Zak will soon be coming to London to accept from Mr. James Howard, who excavated the plane, a piece of her husband's Hurricane, as a memento of the night 37 years ago when she met her husband in such dramatic circumstances.

Mr. Howard, of Kingston, who was delighted that the Hurricane had caused such interest, said that this part of Surrey was rich in aeronautical history. He would like to create an aircraft museum somewhere in the area, and would welcome any offers of accommodation for the rare aeroplanes he and his companions are rebuilding -a barn or hall would be ideal. 
Of river and rowing...

This month, The Arts Society visits Henley to take a look back in time at the diverse history of boats on the river, as narrated by **Nicky Orlebar**...

A n Arts Society coach arrived in Henley-on-Thames, and followed signposts to the River & Rowing Museum in Mill Meadows. Opened in 1998, the wood-clad building quickly proved popular for its Wind in the Willows experience together with displays and minutiae about the River Thames and history of Rowing.

Upstairs in the River Gallery was a map showing some of the 180 islands in the Thames, next to paintings of famous landmarks along its banks.

In the History of Rowing room, displays began with a wooden



Greek trireme known for its power, speed and agility. Other exhibits, some hanging from the ceiling, include an Arctic whaleboat and double sailing skiff popularised by Jerome K Jerome in *Three Men in a Boat*.

There was much film footage of the Oxford v Cambridge Boat Races. The Varsity race was first rowed in 1829, starting from Temple Island to Henley Bridge, a straight distance of one mile 550 yards. In 1839, the Boat Race moved downstream to London between Putney and Mortlake, increasing the meandering course distance to four miles 374 yards. Race statistic charts proved irresistible for some.

Photographs of Henley Royal Regatta ('royal' following Prince Albert's attendance in 1851), held each July, showed spectators watching from either the Buckinghamshire or Berkshire banks. Long considered part of the Social Season, pictures showed a distinct dress code in the Stewards' Enclosure with men in club blazers and ladies in dresses.

Too soon it was time to leave the museum, but not before a visit to the shop and café. Several members returned to the Wind in the Willows exhibition to delight in Ratty's rowing boat and charming mock-ups showing Pooh, Piglet, Kanga, Mole, Badger, Tigger and Eeyore. A perfect end to a delightful day.


